Presidential Determination on Refugee Admissions: Ceiling for FY 2023 is 125,000 refugee admissions.

FY 2023 Regional Allocations



Region	Allocation
Africa	40,000
East Asia	15,000
Europe and Central Asia	15,000
Latin America/Caribbean	15,000
Near East/South Asia	35,000
Unallocated Reserve	5,000
Total Admissions Ceiling	125,000

Priority Categories



Priority 1

Cases identified and referred to the program by UNHCR, a U.S. embassy, or a designated nongovernmental organization (NGO).

Priority 2

Specific groups whose members need resettlement as identified by the Department of State in consultation with USCIS, NGOs, UNHCR, and other experts.

Priority 3

Family reunification cases for spouses, children or parents of individuals lawfully admitted to the United States as refugees or asylees as well as certain Afghans and Iraqis who entered on Special Immigrant Visas.

Stakeholder Population Inquiries | Africa and Central America Fiscal Year 2022

African Countries

USCIS interviewed **19,595** refugee applicants in Africa, reaching applicants in **20** African countries.

Central American Countries

= ~100 refugee applicants interviewed

= approved refugee applications

= admitted to the U.S. as refugees

USCIS interviewed approximately **4**,**100** Guatemalan, Salvadoran, and Honduran refugee applicants.

Approved the refugee applications of approximately **2,850** through the Central American Minors program or from UNHCR referrals.

Over **2,100** refugees from these nationalities were admitted to the U.S. as refugees.

FY 2022 Afghan Refugee Processing



- Interviewed 6,250 Afghan nationals in 32 countries.
 - Approximately 2,184 interviewed in Qatar at Camp As Sayliyah (CAS).
 - Aiming to complete processing of Afghan nationals at CAS within 30 days of arrival.
- Admitted 1,618 Afghan refugees to the United States through USRAP.



FY 2022 Improvements and Growth





Efficiencies

• **Vetting** – Centralized certain refugee applicant vetting at the National Vetting Center.

 Technology – Continued to develop applications in case management system to streamline processing and laid groundwork to move to fully electronic processing.



Staffing

Since FY 2022, increased the number of refugee officers on board by 175% from 105 to 290.

 $_{\odot}$ As of Nov. 21, 2022, 290 are on board.



Training

○ USCIS provided training to 141 new frontline refugee officers.

Fiscal Year 2023 Plans



U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services

Refugee Ceiling of 125,000

USCIS will work to increase admissions and address backlog of pending cases.

Circuit Ride Updates

Deploying staff on 26 circuit rides; aiming to interview approximately 23,000 applicants.

Reducing Processing Times

Identifying processing efficiencies with the Refugee Coordination Center.

FY 2023 Areas of Focus

- Developing a plan and providing guidance to permit attorneys to attend refugee interviews.
- Considering climate change factors as part of the refugee adjudication.
- Updating the USCIS website on a regular schedule with new policies and procedures.
- Enabling refugee applicants to more timely access their applications and related information.

Central American Minors Program



- Provides certain children and family members of El Salvador, Guatemala, and Honduras to apply for refugee status in the United States.
- Awarded funding to the Kids In Need of Defense (KIND) to submit CAM affidavits of relationship.


